

BYLAWS OF THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF MERCEDES, INC. A NON-PROFIT CORPORATION MERCEDES, TX

ARTICLE I

1.01 The principal office of the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc. (the "corporation") shall be at 320 S Ohio, Mercedes, Texas 78570, and the name of its registered agent at such address is the Executive Director.

ARTICLE II PURPOSES

2.01 The corporation is a non-profit corporation organized pursuant to the Development Corporation Act of 1979, as amended, and specifically governed by Section 4A of said Act. The purpose of the Corporation is to promote, assist, and enhance economic and industrial development in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE III DIRECTORS

- 3.01 The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors (the "Board") which shall be composed in its entirety of persons appointed by, and whose terms of offices shall be fixed by, the governing body of the City of Mercedes, Texas (the City).
- 3.02 In addition, the Board may, by contract, resolution, or otherwise, give general or limited or special authority to officers and employees of the corporation to transact the general business of any special business of the corporation, and may give powers of attorney to agents of the corporation to transact any special business requiring such authorization.
- 3.03 The authorized number of Directors of this Board shall be seven (7), appointed in the manner provided in the Articles of Incorporation, In accordance with section 4A of the Development Corporation Act of 1979, as amended, Board members serve at the pleasure of the governing body of the City. Two (2) members shall be the President of the Mercedes Area Chamber of Commerce, or representative from the Chamber of Commerce, and the outgoing Mayor of the City Mercedes, or representative from the City of Mercedes. No member of the City Commission may be a voting member of the Development Corporation of Mercedes.
- 3.04 The Board, acting for the corporation, shall have and exercise all the rights, powers, privileges, authority, and functions given by the general laws of Texas to

nonprofit corporations incorporated under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, as amended (Article 1396-1.01, et seq., Texas Revised Civil Statutes Annotated) and other such powers given by the Development Corporation Act of 1979, as amended (Article 5190.6, Texas revised Civil Statures Annotated).

- 3.05 The Board is hereby required to perform the following duties:
 - 1. The Board shall develop an overall economic and industrial development strategy for the City.
 - The corporation's focus will be primarily in the areas of business retention and expansion, formation of new businesses, business attraction, and the enhancement of community assets to promote economic development.
 - Assurance of accountability for all sales tax funds and all other funds received and expended by the corporation.
 - The corporation shall make reports to the City Commission to include a review of revenues received and expended by the corporation from the City.
- 3.06 The corporation is authorized to do that which the Board deems desirable to accomplish any of the powers or duties set out or alluded to hereinabove and in accordance with State Law.
- 3.07 The annual meeting of the Board shall be held at the Principle Office of the Corporation in January. The Board shall meet in regular meeting at least once each month or on an on call basis at a place and time to be determined by the President and shall be conducted pursuant to all applicable laws. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President or any three (3) Directors on three days notice to each Director, either personally, by mail, or by telephone. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Texas Open Meeting Act. All meetings of the Board of Directors shall be within the City limits of the City of Mercedes.
- 3.08 Regular attendance at the Board meetings is required of all member. Three (3) consecutive absences and/or attendance reflecting absences constitution 50% of the meetings over a 12-month period may constitute the need for replacement of a member. In that event, the member will be counseled by the Board and subsequently, the Board may submit, in writing, to the City Manager of the City of Mercedes a request that the member be replaced by the Mercedes City Commission.
- 3.09 For the purpose of convening a meeting and transacting business, a quorum shall consist of four (4) Directors. If a quorum shall not be present at any meeting of the Directors, the Directors present threat may recess the meeting from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting until a

- quorum shall be present. Any action taken by the Board shall require the affirmative vote of no less than four (4) Directors.
- 3.10 The Board shall be responsible to the Mercedes City Commission for the proper discharge of the Board's duties as assigned in theses bylaws and by the Articles of Incorporation. Its authority is limited by applicable laws, contracts that may be entered into with the City or other entities, and budget and fiduciary responsibilities. The Board, on behalf of the corporation, may request that administrative departments of the City provide assistance to the corporation and the Board in fulfilling its duties. The City and the Board may agree to reimburse any such administrative department's budget for the cost of such services so provided. The corporation may seek legal assistance through the City Attorney or a separate attorney engaged by it for that purpose.
- 3.11 In addition to the Mayor and City Commissioners, the City Manager of the City of Mercedes shall serve as an ex-officio non-voting member of the Board.

NOTICES

4.01 Whenever, under the provisions of the governing statutes of these bylaws, notice is required to be given to any Director, it shall be construed to mean notice in writing, by mail or in person, addressed to such Director at address as appears on the books of the corporation, and such notice shall be deemed to be given at the time when the same shall be thus mailed. Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of the statues or bylaw, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to said notice, whether before or after the time state therein, shall be deemed equivalent thereto.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

- 5.01 The elected officers of the corporation shall be President, Vice- President, Secretary and Treasurer. Any two (2) officers may be held by the same person, expect the offices of President and Secretary.
- 5.02 The Board shall choose such officers at each annual meeting or as soon thereafter as possible. Officers shall serve a term of one (1) year; providing, however, that the officers shall continue to serve until the election of their successors.
- 5.03 The Board may appoint such other officers and agents as it shall deem necessary, who shall hold their offices for such terms and who shall exercise such power and perform such duties as shall be determined from time to time by the Board.
- 5.04 Any officer elected or appointed by the Board may be removed at any time by the affirmative, vote of a majority of the whole Board. If the office of any officer

- becomes vacant for any reason, the vacancy may be filled by the Board for the remaining term.
- 5.05 The President shall preside at all meeting of the Directors, and shall have general supervision of the management and business of the corporation, and shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. The President shall have the right to vote on all matters coming before the Board. The President shall execute bonds, mortgages, and other contracts requiring a seal, under the seal of the corporation, except where required or permitted by law to be otherwise signed and executed thereof shall be delegated by the Board to some other officer or agent of the corporation. The President shall have the authority, upon notice to members of the Board, to call a special meeting of the Board when in his judgment such meeting is required. The President shall have the authority to appoint committees to aid and assist the Board in its business undertaking or other matters incidental to the operation and function of the Board. In general, the President shall perform all duties incident to the office. and such other duties as shall be prescribed from time to time by the Board of Directors.
- 5.06 In the absence of the President, or in the event of his or her inability to act, the Vice President shall perform the duties of the President, and shall perform other such duties as the Board shall prescribe.
- 5.07 The Secretary shall attend all sessions of the Board and record all votes and minutes of all proceedings in a book to be kept for the purpose. The Secretary shall give, or cause to be given notices of all meetings of the Board and shall perform such other duties which may be prescribed by the Board or the President. The Secretary shall be the custodian of the corporate records and seal of the corporation and shall keep a mailing address and street address, if different, of each Director.
- 5.08 To the extent not otherwise provided by the Board, by rules and regulations, in resolutions relating to the issuance of bonds, or in any financing documents relating to such issuance, the Treasurer shall have the custody of the corporate funds and securities and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the corporation and shall deposit all monies and other caluable effects in the name and to the credit of the corporation. The Treasurer shall be bonded for the faithful discharge of his/her duties with such surety and sureties and in such sum as the Board of Directors shall determine by Board Resolution, but in no event shall the amount of such bond be less than an amount equal to the average sums which the Treasurer has access to and the ability to convert during a twelve (12) mother period of time. The Treasurer shall, in general, perform all duties incident to that office and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him/her by the President of the Board. The Board may require the President, Vice-President, and Secretary, (in addition to the Treasurer) to give the corporation bonds and such sums and with such surety

or sureties as shall be satisfactory to the Board for the faithful performance of the duties of their office.

ARTICLE VI MANAGERS, EMPLOYEES, CONTRACTORS

- 6.01 The Board shall have the right to employ a manager for the corporation, and such other full or part-time employees as needed to carry out the programs of the corporation. These employees shall perform the duties as assigned to them by the Board.
- 6.02 The corporation may contract with any qualified and appropriate person or association, for designated tasks which will aid or assist the Board in performance of its duties. However, no such contract shall ever be approved or entered into which seeks or attempts to divest the Board of Directors of its discretion and policy making functions in discharging the duties hereinabove set forth.

ARTICLE VII FINANCIAL PROVISIONS

- 7.01 Fiscal year of the corporation shall begin October 1 and end on September 30 of the following year.
- 7.02 A budget for the forthcoming year shall be submitted and approved by the Board of Directors and the City Commission. The budget proposed for adoption shall include the projected operating revenue and expenses, estimated year-end fund balances, encumbered funds and such other information useful or appropriate for the Board of Directors and the City Commission.
- 7.03 Any two directors of the corporation including the Executive Director shall sign checks or demands for money and notes of the corporation
- 7.04 All funds of the corporation shall be deposited on a regular basis to the credit of the corporation in the City of Mercedes' depository bank.
- 7.05 The corporation may accept any contribution, gift, bequest, or devise for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the corporation.
- 7.06 The board shall have prepared for each annual meeting a full and clear statement of the business and condition of the corporation.
- 7.07 The corporation shall not make any commitment for disbursal of any funds for any one project in excess of \$50,000 without prior approval of the City Commission.

- 7.08 All purchases made and contracts executed by the corporation shall be made in accordance with applicable requirements of the Texas Constitution and Statutes of the State of Texas.
- 7.09 Temporary and idle funds which are not needed for immediate obligations of the corporation may be invested in any legal manner provided in the Public Funds Investment Act (Texas Revised Civil Statutes Annotated Article 842a-2).
- 7.10 Any bonds issued by the corporation shall be in accordance with the Development Corporation Act of 1979, but in any event, no bonds shall be issued without approval of the City Commission after review and comment by the City's bond counsel and financial advisor.
- 7.11 The Board of Directors shall provide for an annual financial audit to be performed by a competent independent audit firm according to generally accepted accounting principles.

ARTICLE VIII BOOKS AND RECORDS

- 8.01 The corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of all actions of the corporation, including books and records of account and minutes of meetings of the Board of Directors and of any committee having any authority of the Board. All books and records may be inspected by Directors, their agents or attorney at any reasonable time or by any member of the Mercedes City Commission. Any information designated as public information by law shall be open to public inspection at any reasonable time. The Texas Open Records Act shall apply to disclosure of public information. A copy of annual financial audits shall be delivered to the City Commission.
- 8.02 The corporation shall provide monthly summaries of receipt and disbursal of funds to the City Commission.

ARTICLE IX SEAL

9.01 The corporate seal shall be circular and shall have inscribed in the outer circle the mane of the corporation and shall have a five point star inscribed in the inner circle. The Board may thereafter alter the seal as necessary without changing the corporate name. These bylaws shall not be construed to require the use of the corporate seal.

ARTICLE X
AMENDMENTS

- 10.01 These bylaws may be altered, changed or amended at any meeting of the Board at which a quorum is present, provided notice of the proposed alteration, change, or amendment be contained in the notice of such meeting.
- 10.02 No amendment to the bylaws of the corporation shall be effective until approved by the governing body of the City of Mercedes, Texas.

ARTICLE XI

11.01 The Board of Directors shall authorize the corporation to pay or reimburse any current or former Director or officer of the corporation any costs, expenses, fines, settlements, judgments, and other amounts, actually and reasonably incurred by such person in any action, suit, or proceeding to which he or she is made a party by reason of holding such position as officer or Director; provided, however, that such officer of Director shall not receive indemnification if he/she is finally adjudicated in such instance to be liable for gross negligence or intentional misconduct in office. The indemnification herein provided shall also extend to good faith expenditures incurred in anticipation of, or preparation for, threatened or proposed litigation. The Board of Directors may, in proper cases, extend the indemnification to cover the good faith expenditures incurred in anticipation of, or preparation for, threatened or proposed litigation. The Board of Directors may, in proper cases, extend the indemnification to cover the good faith settlement of any such action, suit, or proceedings, whether formally instituted or not.

Furthermore the corporation shall indemnify and hold harmless and defend the City of Mercedes, its officers, agents, and its employees, from and against liability for any and all claims, liens, suits, demands, and/or actions for damage, injuries to persons (including death), property damage (including loss of use), and expenses, including court costs and attorney's fees and other reasonable costs arising out of or resulting from the corporation's activities and from any liability or resulting from the intentional acts or negligence, including all such causes of action based upon common, constitutional, or statutory law, or based in whole or in part upon the negligent or intentional acts of omissions of the corporation, agents, employees, licensees, invitees and other persons.

THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF MERCEDES, INC. (referred to as the "corporation"), a Texas non-profit corporation subject to the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, has adopted the following amendments to its Articles of Incorporation filed on February 20, 1980, as stated in these Articles of Amendment.

ARTICLE I

The name of the corporation is THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF MERCEDES, INC.

ARTICLE II

A. Article VII of the Articles of Incorporation (Exhibit A) is amended to read as follows:

The street address of the registered office of the corporation is 400 S. Ohio, Mercedes, Texas 78570, and the name of its registered agent at such address is Richard Garcia.

C. Article VIII of the Articles of Incorporation (Exhibit A) is amended to read as follows:

The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by the Board of Directors, which shall be composed in its entirety of persons appointed by the governing body of the City of Mercedes, Texas. The number of Directors is seven (7). Each Director shall serve a staggered two-year term, based upon on a December 31st anniversary date. No Director shall serve for more than three consecutive two-year terms. Director's terms shall be staggered with four directors appointed on even years and three directors appointed on odd years. In the event a vacancy occurs in one or more of the Director's places, whether caused by death, resignation, disqualification, removal, or expiration of term as provided in this Article, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governing body of the City of Mercedes to hold office until the expiration of the term for which the vacating Director had been appointed

Each Director shall be of good moral character, a United States Citizen, and shall reside within the city limits of the City of Mercedes or within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Mercedes. A Director who ceases to possess the aforementioned qualification shall forthwith forfeit his position, a vacancy shall occur, and such vacancy shall be filed in accordance with this Article.

Directors are removable by majority vote of the governing body of the City of Mercedes at any time at will, provided however, that no action by the governing body of the City of Mercedes shall be required to remove a Director who ceases to possess the qualifications stated herein. The Directors shall serve without compensation, except that they may be reimbursed by the corporation for their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties as Directors.

ARTICLE III

The amendment of the Articles of Incorporation was adopted in accordance with Article VI of the original Articles of Incorporation by the governing body of the City of Mercedes by written Resolution dated February 19, 1980. Furthermore, the amendment of the Articles of Incorporation was adopted at a meeting of the Mercedes City Commission held on December 20, 2005.

1.) CALL MEETING TO ORDER.

Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia called the meeting to Order at 6:00 pm.

2.) ESTABLISH QUORUM.

All members of the City Commission were present at the meeting after Mayor Quintanilla entered the meeting during agenda item #8.

3.) INVOCATION.

The Invocation was given by Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia.

4.) PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Commissioner Guajardo.

5.) OPEN FORUM.

No one signed up to speak before the Commission.

- 6.) CONSENT AGENDA (ORDINANCE NO. 98-21): A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR CITY COMMISSION MEETING(S) HELD DECEMBER 6, 2005; B. REQUEST AUTHORIZATION TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS FOR WATER AND WASTEWATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS. C. APPROVAL OF CHANGE ORDER NO. 1 FOR EXTENSION OF TIME TO THE CONTRACT WITH A.J. CONSTRUCTION FOR BATHROOM FACILITIES AT KENNEDY AND HEB PARK RESOLUTION #2005-87.
- (A.) Commissioner Guajardo made a motion to approve the meeting minutes for the meeting held December 6, 2005. Commissioner Bertholf seconded the motion which passed after Commissioner Garza abstained due to his not been present at that meeting. (6B.) Commissioner Guajardo made a motion to authorize advertising for bids for water and wastewater system improvements. Commissioner Garza seconded the motion which passed unanimously. (6C) Mr. Garcia stated that there had been delays with the project due to changes with the site location; however there was no additional cost to the City. Commissioner Bertholf made a motion to approve Resolution #2005-87 which is Change Order No. I for extension of time to the contract with A.J. Construction. Commissioner Guajardo seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

7.) DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION REGARDING REQUEST BY RIO GRANDE VALLEY MUSIC FESTIVAL.

Mr. Ike Warkentin had previously made a presentation to the Commission requesting \$1,500 for the Rio Grande Valley Music Festival which will be held February 15 – 18, 2006 at the Livestock Show grounds.

Commissioner Garza made a motion to approve Mr. Warkentin's request for \$1,500 for the Rio Grande Valley Music Festival to be held at the Livestock show grounds February 15-18, 2005. Commissioner Guajardo seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

8.) DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION OF BIDS RECEIVED FOR CIVIC CENTER RENOVATIONS.

Mr. Rudy Molina was present for this item. He stated that the following bids had been received for the renovations to the Civic Center: All Pro with a base bid for the amount of \$310,000, \$8,000 for alternate I and \$4,400 for alternate 2 and Spacemaker with a base bid for the amount of \$274,500, \$10,000 for alternate 1 and \$4,000 for alternate 2. He said that alternate #1 is for the addition of a wrought iron fence and alternate #2 is for an alarm system. The Commission went over the work to be done to the civic center, including compliance with ADA. Mr. Garcia stated that the civic center would be renovated to the way it was before, which was an enclosed building. At a question by Commissioner Bertholf, Mr. Rudy Molina stated that he was familiar with Spacemaker and that they do timely and quality work.

Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia made a motion to accept the bid along with alternate #1 and #2 submitted by Spacemaker for the amount of \$274,500 for the base bid, \$10,000 for alternate 1, and \$4,000 for alternate 2 for the renovations to the civic center. Commissioner Garza seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

 DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION AMENDING THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF MERCEDES, INC. BYLAWS.

will Galeia stated that the Labe had discussed some changes to the By-laws. In addition, Mayor Quintanilla had previously stated that he wanted a change to the membership from 5 to 7 to include the Chamber of Commerce president and the former Mayor. Mr. Garcia said that the EDC's recommended changes were items to clean up the bylaws. In addition, there were some changes that staff has looked at which have not been recommended by the EDC members. One of those is the inclusion of the EDC director being under the City's organization as was previously; however, the bylaws state that the director will be hired by the EDC board. Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia stated that he had talked to the EDC director in Weslaco about their EDC operation, which he said is totally independent from the City. At a question by Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia, Mayor Quintanilla said that the by-laws could be amended to change the membership at any time. At a question by Commissioner Bertholf, Mayor Quintanilla said that he felt the EDC director should report to the City Manager as a department head. There was considerable discussion on the matter regarding proposed changes to the by-laws. Commissioner Garza stated that in both Weslaco and Harlingen, the EDC was totally separate from the City. He also added that the work of the EDC would be hindered if the membership were changed from 5 to 7. At another comment that a seven-member EDC board was illegal, Mr. Garcia proceeded to pass out a copy of HB 3036 which was approved by the 79th legislature allowing the governing body to have an EDC corporation with no less than five members.

City Attorney Molina stated that the EDC has recommended changes to the by-laws and that the Mayor and City Commission can either accept or deny the changes. His recommendation is that the changes proposed by the City Commission should first be considered by the EDC board. City Manager Garcia said that the recommendation to go with a seven-member board had already been presented to the EDC. There continued to be discussion by the Commission on this item. Commissioner Bertholf stated that he had made the recommendation to have the former Mayor on the EDC. The amendments to the bylaws proposed by the EDC board include: changing the street address and registered agent in Article I; setting the annual meeting on the second Wednesday of January in Article III - 3.07; setting attendance of the members in Article 3.08; and no commitment of funds for any one period in excess of \$50,000 without prior approval of the Commission in Article VII- 7.07. Staff is additionally proposing the following amendments: adding two additional members (President of the Chamber of Commerce and the outgoing or former Mayor) in Article III, 3.03; authorizing the City manager to hire the EDC director and staff in Article VI - 6.01. Commissioner David Garza asked that the record reflect that the City Attorney had recommended that action only be taken on the changes recommended by the EDC and any action on the changes recommended by staff would be against the recommendation of the City Attorney. Mayor Quintanilla stated that Article III - 3.03 had already been presented to the EDC, and therefore the only recommendation not already presented was Article VI - 6.01.

Commissioner Guajardo made a motion to make the following amendments to the by-laws of the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc: Article I - street address of the principal office of the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc. will be 400 South Ohio, Mercedes, Texas 78570, and the name of its registered agent at such address is Richard Garcia; Article III - 3.07 The annual meeting of the Board shall be held at the principal office of the corporation on the second Wednesday of January of each year; Article III-3.08 Regular attendance at the Board meeting is required of all members. Three consecutive absences and/or attendance reflecting absences constituting 50% of the meetings over a 12-month period shall constitute the need for replacement of a member; Article VII- 7.07 - The Corporation shall not make any commitments for the disbursal of any funds for any one period in excess of \$50,000 without prior approval of the Commission; add to Article III- 3.03 - Two (2) additional members, the President of the Mercedes Chamber of Commerce and the outgoing City Mayor and/or former mayor will constitute the total voting members (7) of the Development Corporation. If the former Mayor is no longer living or if he does not want to serve as member of the Development Corporation, the City Commission shall appoint another person to make it a seven-member board. No member of the City Commission may be a voting member of the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc. Commissioner Bertholf seconded the motion which passed with Commissioner Guajardo, Commissioner Bertholf and Mayor Quintanilla voting in favor and Commissioner Garza and Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia voting against the motion, .

At this time Commissioner Guajardo made a motion to deviate from the agenda and proceed to item #12. Commissioner Bertholf seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

12.) DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ON APPOINTMENT OF MEMBER(S) TO THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF MERCEDES, INC.

The terms of office for Cris Hernandez and Roy De Leon as members to the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc. expire December 30, 2005. Mr. Pena reported that Mr. Michael Rivera has also resigned from that board. Ms. Cris Hernandez has expressed an interest in continuing service. In response to an advertisement, the following persons submitted applications showing an interest in serving on this board: Rudy Salinas, Miguel Castillo, Jr., Bob Gonzalez, Rafael Gonzalez, Jimmy Smith, Dalia Franco, Alfredo Hinojosa, Jr., Barry Jones, Jose Luis Muniz, Jaime Ortiz, and Jose F. Rodriguez. Mr. Rudy Salinas, as president of the chamber of Commerce and Miguel Castillo, Jr. former Mayor are members of the Development Corporation by virtue of the amendments approved on item #9 above.

Commissioner Bertholf made a motion to appoint Edna Martinez, James Beale and Mario Dominguez to the Development Corporation of Mercedes, Inc. Commissioner Guajardo seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia made a motion to continue with item #10. Commissioner Bertholf seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Commissioner Guajardo excused himself from the meeting at this time.

10.) DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION OF BIDS RECEIVED FOR BREATHING AIR STATION.

Fire Chief Jaime Garcia stated that the following bids had been received for the breathing air station: Casco Industries - \$49,324 which includes the option of a dual fill one position for the amount of \$285 and a carbon monoxide monitoring kit for the amount of \$2,349. Mr. Garcia stated that the monitoring kit was not required; which brings the bid amount to \$46,975. Bauer Compressor submitted a bid for the amount of \$49,728 which includes the option of a dual fill one position for the amount of \$330 and the carbon monoxide monitoring kit for the amount of \$2,610 which Mr. Garcia had reported is not required; therefore, it brings the bid amount to \$57,500. In Due Emergency Response Solutions submitted a bid for the amount of \$61,500 with the cost for the dual fill one position being \$500 and the carbon monoxide monitoring kit being \$4,000, which Mr. Garcia had reported is not required; therefore it brings the bid amount to \$57,500. Mr. Garcia is recommending that the lowest bid submitted by Casco Industries be awarded.

Mayor Pro-Tem Garcia made a motion to accept the lowest bid submitted by Casco Industries for the breathing air station for the amount of \$46,975 which includes the dual fill one position option. Commissioner Garza seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

11.) DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION AMENDING ENGINEERING CONTRACT WITH GUZMAN AND MUNOZ

Mr. Garcia reported that this is related to consent item 6B presented above. City Manager Garcia stated that the Commission had been provided with a draft development agreement and that the issue of an easement still had to be cleared up and recommended that no action be taken at this time. No action was taken by the Commission on this item.

Re: SBA Grant- Community Navigator Pilot Program

Background

The SBA Community Pilot Program will strengthen outreach to underserved businesses by partnering with organizations with established relationships and experience within their communities. The program was designed to provide high quality technical assistance with pandemic relief programs and recovery services to small businesses and entrepreneurs. Recovery services can include financial assistance, access to capital, contracting and procurement assistance, marketing, operations, business development, export and industry specific training, among other areas of technical assistance to aid businesses in stabilization and expansion. Programming that focuses on supporting communities where English is a second language is encouraged.

The SBA Community Pilot Program's approach is to have a "Hub"- a regional community organization that leads the project and "Spokes" that work with businesses within targeted communities. These networks leverage the business development expertise of the central "Hub" organization and the community credibility of spoke organizations to better connect business. The Lower Rio Grande Development Council is applying to be a Hub and several Rio Grande Valley community organizations are applying to be spokes. The Development Corporation of Mercedes is applying to be a spoke.

<u>Development Corporation of Mercedes Program</u> Spokes receive \$125K per year for two years.

The grant will aid the Development Corporation of Mercedes in obtaining a dedicated, bilingual, Business Advisor for the response and recovery of small businesses impacted by pandemic. In addition, to being a small business advocate, the Business Advisor will be responsible in maintaining resource partner relationships. For a full job description please see attachment.

The Executive Director would manage the program and ensure program goals are met. Program goals include contacting 22 business owners/entrepreneurs a month and hosting 1 training workshop per month. The Administrative Coordinator and Administrative Assistant aid in obtaining those goals. The focus will be on the Mercedes business community but the service area will be the Mid-Valley region as determined by the Hub. This will serve as small business recruitment tool.

All program funds will be expended on personnel, see attached breakdown. The program would offset general fund salaries, creating a total of \$52,519.48 to the general fund. If the grant is approved the Board should allocate \$17,000 or more towards small business training.

Program Notes

Grant recipients will be notified September 21st with the expectation the program is functioning by the end of the month.

Funds will be dispersed on a quarterly basis; Spoke will be responsible for maintaining program for 90 days.

Monthly reporting to the Hub required. Hub will be purchasing reporting software.

Ultimate Hub goal is to get the program renewed with possible funding for Spoke incubators.

Hub and Spokes will enter into an MOU.

SBA will audit program.

Spokes that are participating: Harlingen EDC, McAllen Chamber of Commerce, City of Mission, City of Brownsville, RGV Partnership and UTRGV COGS.

Recommendation: Approval to advertise the Business Advisor job as soon as possible with a note the vacancy is contingent on grant approval AND approval to open a bank account at Texas National Bank for grant funds contingent on grant approval.

JOB DESCRIPTION Business Advisor

SUMMARY OF POSITION:

The Business Advisor/COVID Specialist will join the Development Corporation of Mercedes team as the dedicated lead for the response and recovery of small businesses impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This position provides consulting and training for small business owner/entrepreneurs impacted by COVID-19 and assists them in stabilizing, recovering, and rebuilding. This position is the subject matter expert for all SBA loan products available to businesses and is responsible for helping owners understand their options.

The Business Advisor/COVID Specialist is a temporary position and is funded with money from the 2020 CARES Act that is set to expire September 21st, 2023. This temporary employment will end with the expiration of the funding.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Plan and market no-to low-cost training on subjects relevant to small business start-up and growth.
- Recruit government, private and public entities, as well as businesses and businesspersons to provide voluntary training
- · Evaluate programs' effectiveness and measure impact of services provided.
- Assist in the transfer of university-based knowledge to the small business community.
- Ensure timely and accurate counseling data input into the information management system.
- Other duties as assigned by the Executive Director.

Budget Notes

Revenue

The Budget reflects an increase in Sales Tax Revenue as the economy is recovering from the Covid-19 pandemic.

Carryover funds include an assumption of a minimum of \$100K in sales tax revenue collected for August and September. This is a conservative assumption.

The SBA program would offset general fund salaries, creating a total of \$52,519.48 to the general fund. If the grant is approved, the Board should allocate \$17,000 or more towards small business training (Downtown Development). The balance (\$35,519.48) will be credited to the Projects line item; these funds are unobligated.

Expenditures

Expenditures are consistent with 2019 and full fills are hard commitments.

The downtown development will be left blank until SBA funding is approved.

As per the last Board meeting, Sponsorships will be approved on a monthly basis.

The CM would like to explore the DCM participating in marketing initiatives.
